A recent University of Florida study showed that supervisors and coworkers think very little of self-absorbed employees who have inflated egos about their job skills. Eventually a superior will notice her misguided power trip and take her down a notch. In the meantime ask for her opinion on something to tame her defensiveness and aggressiveness. "She may reduce the obnoxious bragging and bossiness if she thinks you respect her knowledge," says Bev Smallwood, Ph.D., a psychologist and workplace consultant.

IGNORE! If her clingy, low V-neck sweater caught your eye during the meeting, then it probably caught the eyes of the entire male staff, too. These daily peep shows can make you wonder whether she's going to be favored over you and land more plum assignments. Relax; you're more of a threat than she is. A recent Tulane University study found that women who had tried flirtatious behavior at work (such as wearing short skirts, massaging a man's shoulders, or sending racy e-mails) got fewer pay raises and promotions than those who did not. Those who maintained a professional appearance received an average of three more promotions—earning up to \$100,000 a year to the tart's \$75,000. "Inappropriate dress will detract from her professionalism and credibility," Dr. Smallwood says. "It won't send her up the ladder unless they want to look up her dress."
